

REDWOOD RAMBLE

An early start on a sundrenched morning put my tandem partner (Chris Shirley) and me 150 miles north of San Francisco in California's Redwood country. Our experience bicycle camping had not previously included a tandem. Forgetting we had only two racks, we attempted carefully loading the bike, only to find our gear wouldn't fit. We unloaded, rearranged, reloaded -- and finally left the tent in the car!

The road from Weott soon made us forget our packing problems. Winding through fluted columns among the largest and oldest trees on earth is a quiet, humbling experience. We stopped for a look at the tallest; it was difficult to see the top.

Yet it was the road that was our obsession. It went up: innocently at first, becoming more insistent as we went along, climbing out of the shady groves of Redwoods into the sunlit openness of California's Chaparral. Water bottles empty, we cranked in bottom gear endlessly. Several hours later, twenty-five hundred feet higher, we looked forward to a well-earned downhill run.

No long, winding descent this! Rather, a white-knuckled chute. This road was rough, broken, full of loose gravel, steeper and more treacherous by far than Dante's descent into Hell! And thus we "dropped" into Honeydew. Snug beneath large, shady oak trees, the little town consists of two gas pumps (of course), a general store fronted with porch, bench and a smattering of local population, all of whom were interested:

"What the hell are you doing out here on that thing, anyway?"

Our attempts at nonchalance were unavailing, due to our wide eyes and the speed with which our fingers, still marked with the impressions of brake levers, grasped and dispensed the contents of successive beer cans. Fortunately, the campground was only a few easy miles down the road.

The next morning we enjoyed a more leisurely ride through the Mattole River Valley, filling an empty corner in our panniers with sweet apples from an abandoned orchard. We rode to Petrolia later, where oil was first discovered in California. Larger than its general store and cluster of houses.

Where the Mattole River meets the Pacific, the road turned north and followed the coast. The pavement is privately owned and poorly maintained. Tides and storms have left only half the road useable in some sections. The broken beach road, as if anxious to escape the ocean's torment, leaps up the coast range in a hurry that reduced us to pushing the laden tandem up a grade too steep to ride. We would return to sea level twice the beautiful town of Ferndale, our stop for the night. A small town, its roots are crafts people have restored many of the homes, shops and restaurants around. We camped at the fairground.

In contrast to the riding of the first two days, our third and last day was pure joy. The old Redwood Highway between Ferndale and Weott is a tree and river loving road. A demanding tour ended in shade and gentleness.


The roads are lightly travelled, steep and rough. The towns are small and offer little or nothing in the way of spare parts. Water is not generally available, and houses are scarce. Yet for the spartan traveller, there is beauty and challenge.

The 1980 Tandem Rally will be held in Historic St. Charles, Missouri August 30th to September 1st.

- Saturday Registration 11:00 a.m. 12:00 noon at Noah's Ark Motor Inn. Ride a leisurely 25 miles through St. Charles Historical Area with stops on Old Main Street, and with a Mid-afternoon stop at the Wine Garden, overlooking the Missouri River, for wine and cheese.
- Saturday night we will leave Noah's Ark at 7:30 p.m. to drive to the St. Louis River Front for an evening at the Goldenrod Showboat to see the true story of "Billy the Kid", Melodrama or the best in Ragtime Music. There, are many things to see and do on the Levee, plus the famous Gateway Arch.
- Sunday Meet at Noah's Ark at 8:00 a.m. Leave promptly at 8:30 a.m. for a tour of St. Charles County 60 miles or 30 miles. Cross the Mississippi River on the Golden Eagle Ferry (Cost Approx. \$1.00 each way). This is the last stern-wheeler ferry on the Mississippi River. We will then cycle over scenic rolling hills of Calhoun County to the free Brussels Ferry crossing the Illinois River, to our destination at Pere Marquette State Park Lodge, where we will lunch and rest. On our return trip we will cross the same two rivers.
- Sunday evening at Noah's Ark at 7:30 p.m. there will be the traditional banquet and informal meeting to decide next years rally site.
- Monday Meet at Noah's Ark 8:00 a.m. Leave promptly at 8:30 a.m. for a fast 25 mile tour of St. Charles County.



Headquarters for the weekend will be Noah's Ark Motor Inn - St. Charles, Missouri 63301 I-70 at 5th Street Exit. You make your own reservations at the motel of your choice.

Noah's Ark is holding a block of first floor rooms for participants in the Tandem Rally until July 31st, 1980.

Advance reservations are required for Sunday Banquet (\$9.60 per person), and Saturday night "Billy the Kid" Melodrama (\$3.50 per person balcony). Reservations no later than July 31st.
