

Dear DoubleTalk:


We received the January-February issue of DoubleTalk and were both pleased and displeased with the

I obtained a set of original decals from the factory to embellish my new paint job, and the only remaining task is to build up a new set of wheels.








Dear Bonnie:



TANDEM TRANSCONTINENTAL RECORD
APRIL 12-22, 1986

At four in the morning on April 12, 1986, Lon Haldeman and Susan Notorangelo will begin their intense journey across across America. Starting in Huntington Beach, CA, and ending in Virginia Beach, VA, Lon and Susan Plan on making the 2,900 mile trip in under 10 days on their custom Tango tandem. By riding 280 to 420 miles per day along their carefully scouted route, they hope to better their 1983 Tandem Transcontinental Record of 10 days, 20 hours.

Ultra-distance cycling is not new to either Susan or Lon. Between the two of them, they have cycled across the country a dozen times,







including three wins during the Race Across AMerica (RAAM) and several solo and tandem crossing records. They predict this upcoming tandem attempt will rank among the toughtest crossings they have made so they have a healthy respect for the challenges that await them.

Lowering the record below ten days is their goal, but more importantly they want cyclists across the country to remember Canadian cyclist Wayne Phillips and the challenges he must face for the rest of his life. Wayne was seriously injured during the 1985 RAAM when he was struck by a hit and run truck. Wayne is recovering slowly, but serious internal and spinal cord injuries mean only a slim chance that he will be able to walk or cycle again. Donations to help Wayne buy the special equipment he now needs to live a productive life would be appreciated by anyone who understands the challenges he now faces.



INTERVIEW WITH

JACK & KEN TAYLOR

BBC: Taylor made bicycles is a phrase the three Taylor brothers are very proud of because after nearly 45 years of being in the biycle business that's just what they do. Hand made bikes that glisten and gleam in every color of the rainbow and look almost too good to take on the road. And the Taylors are just as proud about how and when they started.







- JACK: 1936 we started, and it was here at my mother's house. And as the business progressed, I came in with Norman and we proceeded from there. But before that we bought bicycles and joined the Stockton Wheelers Cycle Club. When we joined the Stockton Wheelers, we found that all the enthusiasts had high class lightweight hand-made bikes usually made in the London area at that time.
- BBC: So the Taylors took on the London firms. They knew what a good bike should feel like, how it should perform and stand up to the rigors of road racing and touring because that was their interest. So it wasn't long before they were making top class machines and today they'll make just about anything as Ken & Jack Taylor explain.
- KEN: We make ordinary bicycles as you would say, and then we make touring tandems, racing tandems, triplets, tricycles, tandem tricycles, two wheels at the front, two wheels at the back, we make anything.
- JACK: Oh, basically we do everything that nobody else would be bothered with. That's our business.
- BBC: Tell me about these triplets.
- JACK: Well, we've made four a month ago and our triplet it's intended for a family, a father, a mother, and a child. The tandems have gotten very popular in the last 10 years. In fact, for a while we were the only firm in England making a tandem. Since the motor car got popular in the 1950's, the English girls wouldn't go on the back of a tandem. It wasn't good enough so all the firms stopped making them. What happened in America when we stopped, they started riding tandems. Those coming over from America were quite wealthy people. They were buying our tandems probably for health reasons.
- BBC: How much would one of these triplet bikes cost?
- JACK: Oh, the last one we sold was 11,200 pounds (about \$16,000 US), plus the VAT. I thought the guy would have a fit when it was time to pay for it. But he wrote the check out without the flicker of an eyelid. He said it was one of the best things he'd ever bought, and it was a 10-year investment for his family.

- BBC: It's a lot of money to pay for a bike, isn't it?
- KEN: Not really, when you consider all the work involved, and it's a one-of job, and it's got the most exclusive parts on it, disc brakes that are made in California. It has a 15-speed gear system. They're very exclusive.
- JACK: When we first started making them and you know came to pick them up from me mother's house, we used to put them up on display and inspect them, and never take our eyes off them. And when the lads used to come and pick them up, me mother used to say, "he isn't going to let it go, you know."
- BBC: Did you used to have this up in front of you while you were eating a meal?
- JACK: Yes, we'd put the finished bicycle up on probably the side bar, somebody was probably coming by to pick it up in an hour or two, and we'd all be looking at it and inspecting it like a work of art.
- KEN: We didn't like to part with them.
- JACK: Sometimes you get an idiot-type of people buying these bikes and they go out and mangle them all up and almost destroy them and we feel like tearing out hair, you know. The only thing is you can't reallly grumble when you've been paid for them. You got to forget about that one and get on with the next one.
- BBC: Now, there's the three of you involved in this business.
- JACK: Yes, my brothers Ken and Norman.
- BBC: Who's the boss. The oldest one?
- JACK: Well, I'm the oldest one, but over the years we've gotten tired of arguing with each other to try and get everybody to do a higher standard of work. They say my ideas and, of course, you're aiming for perfection and, of course, you don't always get it and we'd go around the bend if anybody did anything wrong, but anyway over the years, I've mellowed a bit and I find it takes a lot of energy to argue and try to make them do something better so I leave it to themselves and I know they're doing their best, and I'm doing my best, and that's what you







hope for. You settle down to a happy way of working instead of trying to force people to do things they don't want to.

BBC: Who would you really like to sell one of your bikes to? Someone that you'd really like to tempt to buy a bike?

KEN: Naturally, we sell them to a lot of people in Hollywood. 40% of what we make goes to Los Angeles.

BBC: Are actors buving your bikes?

KEN: Well, they never like to say who they are. They like to keep it quiet. They just like to buy them and ride them and they don't want any publicity. We also sell a lot to people in the Far East, where all the oil comes from.

BBC: They're riding around the desert on bikes?

KEN: I don't know where they're riding them, but they are very good ones, very expensive ones, the racing tandems.

JACK: A few years ago, when we exhibited at Earls Court, we got an order from an Arab Sheik, and we had to deliver the tandems to his airplane to take it across and we didn't know what they were going to do with them, but we got the money all right, and then one time we got an order from Russia. They bought 10 tandems and 10 bikes and we delivered them to a Russian ship on the London docks, and as soon as they were on the ship, we got paid. But when the London newspapers found out we got this order, they said, "Oh, what color did you paint them?" and we said, "Oh, red, white, and blue." We learned later that they were used in the Olympic games and some Russian guy on one of the bikes had won a road race on it. But in a lot of cases we don't learn the outcome of the bicycles and the activities. Some people buy them second hand, maybe 30 years after we've made them, and they'll send the number and say when was it originally manufactured. Who was the original owner? And sometimes this will take up to an hour looking through all the records to give them an answer. But we try to do it to help them out.

BBC: Jack Taylor Cycles may not quite be a cottage industry, but it isn't far from it.



DON'T LET THE

RAIN STOP YOU

Back in mid-summer, 1985, the Rochester, NY, group of TCA members decided to plan a tandem tour of Canada's Niagara Frontier. We confidently picked October 5 & 6 as a weekend of beautiful fall foliage and golden October days.

route was to be one used by the Rochester Bicycle Club several times in the past. It starts in F. Erie. Canada, follows the Niagara Parkway along the Niagara River, past lovely homes, parks, marinas. vineyards, orchards, Niagara Falls, floral displays, and the River Gorge to the beautiful, historic of Ni agara-on-the-Lake. village From there it goes west to St. Catherine's, ONT, and up the Welland Canal (part of the St. Lawrence Seaway system) to a motel near the Canal. The day's travel -The next day, the about 53 miles. route returns east to Niagara Falls and back up the River to our cars in Ft. Erie, about 37 miles.

Reservations and parking arrangements were made. Anticipation was high. Several couples began regular training rides. The weather the week prior was absolutely spectacular. However, as we watched the weather forecasts for the weekend, the prospects looked worse and worse. It had been agreed, though, that we would ride rain or shine.







Saturday AM came and so did the rain. The four teams got to Ft. Erie and started north on the route under very threatening skies, but dry roads and with a fierce overthe-left-shoulder wind. We stopped for lunch in a light drizzle, rain wear still in the panniers. During lunch the with gusts increased to nearly gale force. The rain poured down. We left lunch with rain gear on, and a stinging rain coming straight at us at times. The hardest riding was west from Niagara-on-the-Lake into a northwest wind (but no rain) for about 8 miles

on-the-Lake into a northwest wind (but no rain) for about 8 miles before turning south along the Canal where we got some protection from houses and trees. We finally reached the motel with the rain stopped and wind reduced. A warm comfortable motel room and a shower with unlimited hot water, a good meal, considerate waitressess, and a couple of hours of friendly conversation and laughter put the difficulties definitely behind us. We all agreed that the day had been "great riding". What's more, we meant it.

Sunday was a beautiful day, but what made the tour such a success was the mix of couples, group concern, sensitivity, and enthusiasm. No one had to ride alone, although we did separate into two-couple groups because of different riding abilities. We agreed to meet at vantage points along the way where we stopped for rest, socializing, and sight-seeing.

We all had a marvelous time, made more memorable by the weather and our conquering of it. The scenery only enhanced what the people themselves provided.

MORAL: Don't be deterred by the

threat of bad weather. You may miss some of the most enjoyable friendship experiences possible.

HINT: It pays to call the motel before you leave your starting point to confirm your reservations. Once when left in the rain, we stopped to call the motel. Imagine our surprise to discover that they had decided we wouldn't be coming because of the rain and had decided to try to sell our rooms, even though they had our deposit. Fortunately, they hadn't let any of them go yet, but we won't take that chance again.

THE TANDEM TOOLBOX

This time, I would like to take a look at a few tools that can make tandem maintenance at home easier. So many tandem owners tend to be "marooned" from nearby dealers that they are responsible for all the repairs themselves, along with keeping any singles (remember singles, those funny bicycles with only one rider?) in the house running.

My favorite bike repair tool is the fourth hand, or cable puller. It is a small pliers-like tool that can grip a cable and allow you to push back against the housing stop. I guess it is called a fourth hand







because it was designed after the 3rd hand, which is a more common brake tool to most bicyclist. A fourth hand can be used by itself for brake work, and it is also quite useful for adjusting derail-leur cables.

This tool replaces the pliers you are using now when you wish to pull a stretched cable tight again. It also gives you more control of the tension you are applying. It is especially nice when working with cantilever brakes because you tension both the control cable and the transverse cable, which is left slack if you are clamping the brake pads against the rim with a third hand.

Fourth hands are made by a variety of Japanese, French, and American bike tool makers and will run between \$10 and \$15. My personal best is the HKC model with my first one now lasting through two summers of full time bike repair. Compe version wore out season of shop use, but should be after okay for the home user. The fourth hand is based upon a spring design and does not offer the control of a pliers mechanism.

The two other tools I'll mention are both variations on allen wrenches. Park has introduced a series of allen "Y" wrenches, including one offering 4mm, 5mm, and 6mm allens on one easy-to-hold It is very handy for the new derailleurs which all seem to be going to allen fitting and works nicely on seat post binders, eccentrics, and stems and bars. It will not reach some fittings, like La Prade seat posts and Cinelli stems, but does enough to be useful if you are working on a lot of newer equipment.

Another neat and useful allen

is the Bondhus hex ball ver. These are allen wrenches have been modified to allow which them to work at an angle. Bondhus says not to use them where a heavy torque must be applied, they allow you to get at hard to reach allen fitting and spinning them in. If you have installed a Sanyo generator, or have a Santana kid-back, you will appreciate the angles they allow you to work They are available in most metric sizes and sell for about \$5 to \$7 each, with a screwdriver-style han-

While these tools may be most useful to a shop mechanic, they can make routine bike work less of a chore, if you are so inclined. And if you are "into" tools, they are just a few more you just can't live without. Now if I can only chase down a 41mm socket for removing Arai brake drums, I'll be all set.


