

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Parc National de La Mauricie, Riviere à Pierre, and Cap Santé

29 July 2011 to 1st August 2011

Tim and Dot, our partners in tandeming, arrived to pick us up at about 6:30am. After coffee and muffins, we set off on the 2 hour drive to Shawinigan, the starting point for our four day tour. We arrived at the Hotel Esplanade, a very bike friendly place, about 9:15am. We parked the car, and we were allowed into our room straight away so that we could store any gear that we would not be using for our day ride. Now THAT's bike friendly. It was about now that I realised that I had left my wallet at home, and Marge, my partner for life, had left her credit card at home in the search for weight reduction. Fortunately, Tim was generous enough to bail us out for the long weekend.

Our first day was a 108km tour into the Parc National de la Mauricie. We began pedaling about 10am. We hadn't gone far when we caught up with another tandem couple on a 6-day tour. Tim spotted that their back wheel was not running true. It turned out that they had a broken spoke. We left them with a plan to get their wheel fixed at the next village where there just happened to be a bike repair shop. The entry fee to the Parc was a rather steep \$29 for the 4 of us. The road surface is very good along the whole circuit, with lots of hills (1320m total climb). However, apart from the fresh air, the rest of the ride is summed up by saying trees and rocks and water. Not an

awe-inspiring road for scenery, but very good to get the legs ready for tomorrow. At the end of the ride, two 16-inch pizzas and a couple of beers each were bought and dealt with. Mmmm. For some reason, we retired to the Hotel Esplanade early and slept like logs. One or two of us made noises like we were actually in a sawmill, so I'm told. But that's a story for another day.

Shawinigan to Riviere à Pierre, 95km

The weather forecast was excellent and after a good breakfast at the hotel, we set off to find Riviere à Pierre. We negotiated the suburbs of Shawinigan with no difficulty and with little traffic to deal with, we forwent the Google bike route and stayed with the more direct route 153. The good hard shoulder lasted all the way to Ste Tite (Home of the biggest Country Festival in Eastern Canada, with 450,000 visitors per year) where we took

a "pause cafe" and chatted with a group of guys. It's here that we learned that we only thought we could speak French as their accent was very broad, none-theless, understanding came with repetition and patience and there were no raised voices at all. While relaxing in the sunshine, drinking our coffee, a couple on a very nice KHS tandem rode by. We spent 10 minutes learning about the locality and the trials and tribulations of trying to buy a Tandem in so remote (relatively) an area. Incidentally, Ste Tite is a very pleasant little town, very clean and flowery, dominated by a large stadium, and just out of town, acres of camp sites to cater for the aforesaid Festival.

We decided to turn off route 153 and take a diversion down to Lake Pierre-Paul to see more of the rural side of the country. The cycling became brilliant with perfect weather and open vistas over large bright green fields. Villages are far apart and there is little food or drink sup-





port as we meandered our way past pretty farms and cottages in an almost absolute traffic free environment. We passed through Thomas arriving at Lac aux Sables with an expectation of finding an ice cream. However this was not to be, and we had to wait for another 18 or so kms to indulge at Notre Dame des Anges. The convenience store (or depanneur) in Notre Dame des Anges is also a hardware store, and it also sold liquor. It was also, understandably, very busy.

With 22km to go, the asphalted road became very rolling, and it was quite rough in places. To make up for this, there were some extensive views over the river valley to our left. We arrived at Riviere à Pierre about 3pm, and found Zac's Bar. The picture on Google is a rundown hovel; however, it's now spanking new and here we downed a couple of cold Buds, which tasted great, and we relaxed in the sunshine.

Riviere à Pierre has been a community since 1880, and its staple industry is a very large granite quarry. The product

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from the quarry is shipped out of town by rail, which runs right through the middle of town. More on this later.

We rode a mile or so down the road and found our B&B, "Couette et Confitures." We checked in and felt at home at once. We were offered an evening meal, but stupidly decided not to take it, as we found out later that the Landlady was an excellent chef. We marched back into town after a refreshing swim in their pool and bought take away food to eat at Zac's Bar over a pint or two of Bud. After all, it had been a very dehydrating day.

Back at the B&B there was this delightful Grandfather clock which chimed every 15mins and struck every hour. I was just getting used to the rhythm of this when the first train made itself heard in the distance. At 3:40am after an infinite number of whistles it arrived. I had no idea that a train could rock a granite house built on the Canadian Shield so much. We just got settled again when the second train came through. Life's full of excitement. In the morning, somewhat bleary eyed, we went down for a superb three-course gourmet breakfast that included a delicious ham and cheese omelette on an English Muffin and a fruit-filled crepe.

There were other guests at the table, and Marge and I made it known that we were doing a French immersion trip, however, the others in this very French speaking part of Canada would have none of it and insisted they practice their English. So we had the inevitable bilingual conversations so common in Montreal:

French folks speaking English and English folks speaking French. Magic.

Riviere à Pierre to Cap Santé-108km

We got on the road about 9am, after deciding that we would do a side trip to the Chutes de Marmite, 6 km up the road. After a deviation or two from the direct route, we made it and had a fun walk round the Falls.

One of the reasons we came to this part of the world was to ride the Jacques Cartier Rail-to-Trail, a 68km gravel right of way which meandered through the back country down to the suburbs of Quebec City.

The trail is well surfaced and, apart from a few areas where there was a little too much rock dust, it was fast and easy to ride. This website will get you started if you are interested:

We left the Trail after 54km and found a great Irish pub in Ste Catherine

de la Jacques Cartier called Dazibos. It's well worth the effort to visit.

The next 15km is on a cycle Trail called the Piste Cyclable Dansereaux between Ste Catherine and Pont Rouge. This path is only 15km long, but it a perfect example of how bike paths for recreation should be laid out. The trail meanders by the side of the Jacques Cartier River, and is well used by locals and visitors alike.

The next section to our hotel in Cap Santé was basically downhill with the wind behind us, however, the pleasure was somewhat tempered by hunger and fatigue. Our moods were brightened up by meeting up with the tandemists with the broken spokes we had run into on our first day as they were on their way home. However, all good things come to an end, and we found Motel sous les Chemilles .

The lodging is good and bike friendly, rooms big and clean, the downside is

that it is remote from restaurants. There is a mediocre Chinese a kilometre down the road (exactly), which is not to be recommended. Our mistake was not to eat before we left Cap Santé itself. Except for that oversight, this was a perfect cycling day.

Cap Santé to Shawinigan - 94km

We rose early and went for breakfast in the Motel, then made a lazy start in cool rain, with lightning flashes on the south side of the St Laurence. A 60% chance of precipitation was forecast, so we hoped this would be it. Soon enough, it dried up and the sun came out. We rode along the flat, traffic free route 138 and made good time to Ste Anne da la Pérade, where we stopped for coffee and a second breakfast. Shortly after, there is a bridge over the Batiscan River which has a metal grating deck. Our experience is that this is ok to ride if it is dry, when wet however, it can be very slippery. With this in mind we decided to dismount and walk our bikes on the pedestrian walk way.

This turned out to be not so easy as there were two "U" bends in the narrow path which were not designed for tandems with bags.

We joyfully rode through road works and alongside the river to Pizza67 in St Narcisse, where we had a great lunch for less than \$10 each. After that great lunch, we followed the small roads northwest toward Lac à la Tortue. Then the heavens opened and amidst heavy rain, hail, thunder, and lightning we ran for shelter in the workshop of a garage to wait out the downpour. It lasted about 45 minutes,

then out came the sun again and off we went for the last few miles.

In brilliant post storm sunshine we arrived at the car, loaded the bikes and set off home.


I must admit the car seat was a lot more comfortable than the bike saddle.

In summary, this is a very bike friendly part of the world; it's a chance to visit quiet rural landscapes that are increasingly rare. Everyone we met was friendly and welcoming, and language should not be an issue even for the most unilingual, due to the locals wanting to practice their English.

There can be surprisingly long distances between support shops, for food and drinks so it pays to be prepared.

Except for the Parc National de La Mauricie, the terrain is rolling rather than hilly.

Florida Tandem Rally 2011

Halloween weekend in Florida is when the PANTHERS summon fellow tandem riders to gather at The Villages for a weekend of pedaling and fun.

My husband, Bill, and I are fortunate to be a part of this great group of tandem riders known as the Florida Panthers. This club is based in The Villages in Central Florida, but it also includes members who live and ride throughout the state of FL.

At the ice cream social on Friday evening, we could sense the excitement as more and more of the 55 teams who would be attending the Second Annual Florida Tandem Rally wandered into the registration area to pick up their packets of maps and goodies and mingle with like-minded folks. The rally was headquartered at the Waterfront Inn, a

great fullservice hotel located in The Villages, a sprawling, pedestrian-friendly retirement community only 24 miles south of Ocala. After the ice cream "dessert" (you should always consider

eating dessert first – life may be short!), we walked a block along the lake to the Sumter Landing town center to check out the music and dancing in the square and enjoy a fresh seafood dinner at one of the many restaurants.

Saturday morning greeted us with rain. Should we ride anyway? Would it stop?

Bob Thompson, president of the PANTHERS (Partners Aboard Neat Tandems Happily Enjoying Riding Simultaneously), said the ride would start as scheduled. Folks could decide whether to ride or wait for the sun. We opted for a late start, but by 9 a.m. (scheduled ride start time), the drizzle had stopped, and we started with the crowd. Many teams did wait on the sun to dry the roads.

Villages resident Charles Futrell, 91, who set a USA Triathlon record this year as the oldest male finisher, led the cyclists en masse from the Inn. All rides shared the route for the first 2 miles, with Ray and Linda Cannerella leading the pack at a sensible pace for riding on wet pavement. At the first traffic light, two deputies from Sumter County held off oncoming traffic to let the tandems cross the highway for the 32-mile ride or turn down the highway for the 44- and 62-mile rides. A few miles later, we were into the rolling hills and farmland of Lake County.

Bill and I gradually inched up to what we thought was the lead group for the 44-mile ride. By now the sun was drying the roads and we were rolling at 21 and 22 mph, with an exhilarating pace line of six or seven tandems. We were just entering

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the lead position when POP, our front tire blew and the rim hit the pavement. Thankfully, the riders behind us were very alert. They all spread out, giving Bill space to maneuver the bike to the swale, and no accidents occurred.

Just a few miles before our flat, we had learned we'd missed a turn and would be pedaling 62 miles. During the tire change, we discovered many in our party were hoping to finish quickly, making time to visit an off-road mountain bike trail that afternoon. We told them to go on to the rest stop. A few teams, including Paul and Jeanne Knudsen of Royal Palm Beach, and Melanie Ashby and Frank Phelps of Miami, stayed back to help us. Then we all hammered together for three intense miles to the tiny market in the forest, where we jumped ship. The rest of the riders regrouped and sped on.

Before long other tandem teams pulled in. Two of the couples were buzzing about what they had just seen – a bear.

"I saw him walking toward the fence. It was a big, full-sized black bear," said Kay O'Neal of Stone Mountain, Ga.

"He came out and was looking around," Bob O'Neal said. The O'Neal's, and Ken and Michelle Languedoc, said they stopped as soon as they could. They were going to ease back toward the bear, but he ambled off into the woods before they could get back with their cameras.

We finished the ride at a more leisurely pace, stopping for a delicious boxed lunch at the Wildwood Community Center, before bucking the wind the last seven miles to the Waterfront Inn.

More wonderful food awaited us at the evening banquet, held within pedaling distance of the hotel. Some of The Village residents came to the banquet hall by golf cart.

During the post-dinner ceremonies, Valerie and Richard McKay of Garden Valley, Idaho, won for traveling the farthest distance and Jack and Pat Deacon of Lexington, KY, took the prize for the most combined years. Ken and Michelle Languedoc of Jupiter, FL, won for having the fewest years. They also won the day's Visual Treasure Hunt with their added entry at the bottom of their cue card: Mile Marker 21.4, a black bear.

The rally wrapped up on a cool, crisp Sunday with rides mapped rides of 29 and 41 miles to stretch legs before the trip home. Soon it was time to bid newfound friends goodbye, and to make plans to return to the Villages on Oct. 26, 2012 for the PANTHERS Third Annual Florida Tandem Rally.

Just remember: Same time, same place, next year.

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How to make your tandem lighter and have a smoother ride... part II

(otherwise known as a product review)

Okay...so I fibbed just a little bit. This article is a review of the 2nd item we recently learned of and that has earned its coolness factor.

Selle An-Atomica Saddle. Tandem teams (heck - any cyclist) and their saddle preferences are stories of legend that can go on forever. Suffice to say, whether leather, gel-filled, sheep skin covered, or duct tape over plywood, each captain and stoker struggle to find the proper 'interface' with their tandem. Both captain AND stoker has to be satisfactorily seated for the tandem to roll down the road. Worse yet – once you find a saddle that works, sooner or later that model may no longer be manufactured or available, and electrical tape can only patch sooooo much! With that perspective in mind, and my stoker's Terry saddle coming to the end of its life, I began the hunt for a new saddle.


If you haven't found it yet, the tandem-specific portion of the BikeForums blog site [bikeforums.net/forumdisplay. php/44-Tandem-Cycling] is a great source of all-things-tandem information. Several online tandem riders suggested the Selle An-Atomica, along with a select few other saddle types. The comment most frequently seen was how they'd hopped on this new saddle and rode unusual distances on their first ride! Going

to the web site, there's good information on the design and philosophy of the Selle An-Atomica, which was all very helpful, as well and movies of the seat 'in action'. I was not, however, expecting to pay such a high price, compared to previous saddles. What was I to do with an expensive saddle if my stoker didn't like it....? More searching led me to the online "House of Tandems-Texas" in Spring, TX, a retailer who stocks the saddle, and contact info for the owners Marcia and Ric Becker. Several emails and a couple of phone calls transpired before I was (half-) convinced to spend \$180 for a new stoker seat.

After several days in the mail, the new saddle arrived. It looked for all the world like the other leather and brass rivets, hammock-style, old school saddle we'd both previously tried, but didn't like. It also seemed a bit longer than a typical woman's saddle. This one though, has a curvy cut-out down the middle, and a tension adjustment allen screw right under the nose, though there were no directions for tension adjustment. The whole thing looked sturdy enough, but seemed like a candidate for uncomfortable pinching, or sliding fore and aft. I mounted it on the seat post in about the same place and height as the previous saddle and took it for a spin. A leisurely 25 mile test ride proved I wouldn't need to return it, but the next day's 65 mile ride sealed the deal. Other than tweaking the seats' tilt and fine-tuning the tension, the saddle has (happily) gotten rave stoker reviews. Something about the type of leather and the tension adjustment has kept my stoker from sliding on the but-

tery smooth seat. I even give her a small 6 mm allen wrench, so she could find the best seat-tension setting on the fly. The seats thickness didn't look like much at first, but is apparently quite sturdy and very well crafted, even though we're not a featherweight team. Her previous saddle had had copious padding but was not a gel saddle. I was told and read several places that no breaking period required, and that has proven correct. We've got about 200 miles on the new seat, just as the century part of the cycling season kicks into high gear. We (she) have no heartburn tackling the centurys with her new seat, contrary to some of my other 'good ideas'. The Selle An-Atomica seems to be such a good purchase I'm considering adding another one to my Christmas list to Santee Claws for the captain's position. There's no reason why only the stoker should be nice and comfy, hmmm!

Southern Tandem Rally 2011

Last September, tandem teams from throughout the South (and from parts beyond!) convened in Raleigh, North Carolina, for the 32nd Annual Southern Tandem Rally. Headquarters Hotel was the Hampton Inn - Airport, and the DoubleTree, next door to the Hampton, was available for those who wished to enjoy slightly more luxury than offered by the Hampton. It was your choice! The host team was Smith Doss and his lovely wife, Claude Monnier.

It was with a bit of trepidation when we arrived at the host hotel. After all, the hotel was near the airport, there were busy streets all over, and how can you have good rides like that? No worry! Smith and Claude had promised we'd be out of the busy city and into the country in a matter of minutes, and they lived up to their word.

Typically, Friday rides at STR are from a remote start. No one likes to mix it up with end-of-workday rush hours, especially when you can drive for a few minutes to a quite church parking lot and start on great roads, right away. Since we'd arrived on Thursday evening, we opted to ride the morning version of the ride. We met at 9:00am, and Claude gave the weather report. She forecast, "You'll have about an hour and half before the rain starts." And we were off! We opted for one of the shorter distances, as we believed that Claude knew her North Carolina weather. And she was absolutely correct! Almost exactly 90 minutes into

the ride, right after we'd made the fortuitous decision to take the middle distance ride, the raindrops began to fall. Then more of those pesky raindrops fell. Finally, it was all we could do to see the road ahead of us! Fortunately the traffic was so light that we didn't even worry about the cars - there weren't many to contend with on these roads at all. And, it was one of the warmest rains we've ever ridden in. We made it back to our ride start and our truck without any major problems (tho' one of the couples riding with us did suffer a flat – in the rain – only a mile or so from the finish). A short drive back to the dry, warm, hotel was appreciated. Gotta love a hot shower at the end of a wet ride.

After showering, Susan and I headed off to find lunch, and then to find REI. We always try to find a local café or restaurant when we travel, and we were successful again on this trip. We found a small restaurant that looked like a sports bar (boy, were we surprised!), next to

Days Inn a few blocks away from the Hampton. When we walked into the café, there wasn't a tv to be seen! There was a wide selection of beers and burgers to choose from, and one of the best salad bars we'd seen. Life was good. Oh, the Raleigh REI was good, too, but we

didn't find anything we needed there. What a bummer!

Friday night was the official "Welcome to STR" party, with terrific desserts to choose from. The party was at the Raleigh Art Museum, a great place that's open late on Friday nights for our visiting. Or you could just stay at the "Dessert Room" and eat until you couldn't move! I don't think anyone went hungry from a lack of dessert.

Saturday morning, we awoke to the sound of rain gently hitting the windows of our hotel room. Would it continue throughout the day, or would we be able to get in a Saturday ride? 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
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
